



Start the day with a leisurely breakfast of tropical fruit and your first Tanna Coffee, then jump on a local bus and head into Port Vila. There's nothing so formal as a bus stop here – just stick out your hand and tell the driver where you want to go.

As a first port of call, we recommend a wander around the fruit and veg markets. They're popular with locals and tourists alike; bustling, colourful places with a great atmosphere. Share a laugh with the mamas who run the stalls and stock up for a picnic later.

While food is on your mind, you should pop into one of the patisseries and grab a freshly-baked treat for morning tea. You can always burn it off with a stroll along the seafront boardwalk that runs alongside Port Vila Harbour. Make sure you stop at the Handicraft Market to check out the beautiful, handmade gifts.

The waterfront is also a great place to hook yourself up with a few tours to explore the island's must-see attractions. But there's really no rush. You're in Vanuatu now. So sit down at one of the city's many cafes and reset your clock to Aelan time. Just make sure you're at the harbour in time for the Port Vila Sunset Cruise, which leaves at 4pm. It really is the perfect way to finish the day.

Morning at Zipline | Take in the best views Efate has to offer at Vanuatu Jungle Zipline and Skybridge. You will feel like Tarzan as you fly through the jungle canopy with

the wind rushing through your hair.

If you're looking for a more relaxed - but equally spectacular - way to explore the rainforest, the new Vanuatu Skybridge allows you to view the fern valleys, canyons and hidden pools from 65 metres above ground.

Afternoon at Hideaway Island | Head over to Hideaway Island for some underwater therapy. If you're new to Vanuatu, prepare yourself for the most amazing sight. The tropical fish and coral that lie just a few metres from the beach are quite spectacular. And no trip to Vanuatu is complete without sending a postcard from the underwater post office. Hideaway Island is also one of the best places on Efate to watch the sunset with a cold drink.

Evening | After a big day out, head back to Vila for the pizza and movie night at Nambawan Café or make your way over to the Beach Bar, where you can sit and relax to the sounds of the ocean.

DAY 3: A day of vibrant colours

Morning at the Blue Lagoon | Around 45 minutes from the centre of Port Vila is the Blue Lagoon. If a picture speaks a thousand words, we've not a great deal to add. It's a beautiful place to enjoy a picnic and spend the morning in the crystal-clear water. You'll no doubt find yourself reverting back to your childhood once you discover the rope swing. Just don't forget to let go.

Afternoon at Eden on the River | From the bluest of blues to every green you can imagine, Eden on the River is a spectacular setting of wild jungle and river cascades. You'll find many ways to explore – whether it's climbing over suspended bridges, taking a leisurely walk through the extensive gardens or floating downstream on a river tube. You can even play a round of mini-golf to the soundtrack of birdsong.

Congoola Day Cruise | Around a 30-minute drive from Port Vila, the waters around Havannah Harbour are home to some of Efate's best snorkelling spots. Catch an old sailing boat to remote beaches and secluded reefs, often accompanied by dolphins and turtles. It's an unforgettable experience best capped off with a BBQ lunch on an

Lelepa Island Snorkelling Tour | Join the team on colourful banana boats, as you travel to the island of Lelepa for some of the best coral viewing and snorkelling spots. The trip takes you right around the island, visiting the local village and island caves. Try your hand at kayaking, enjoy a beach BBQ and learn all about the area from your friendly guides.
